Salazar Thankful for FHN's Breadth of Care 'A Hysterectomy ... and a Whole Lot More'

In 2018, FHN's Women's Health Team confirmed Tamara Salazar needed a hysterectomy due to a prolapsed uterus. It was regularly causing her discomfort, but wasn't an emergency. She put it off to help another family member who was ill, and then COVID-19 came ... with a vengeance.

Busy with life – work, her husband, and four active girls – Tamara thought she could fend off COVID-19 with some time off and a few days in bed. "I can beat it," she said. Instead, she wound up in the hospital and ended up in a coma. "My blood oxygen went down to 49 percent and they didn't think I was going to make it," she shares. She spent 94 days away from home, finally waking on Thanksgiving Day, 2021.

Luckily, thanks to "an amazing group of compassionate professionals" from FHN (see sidebar on page 3) and beyond, Tamara survived her COVID-19 ordeal. She considers herself about 80 percent of the way back to a healthy life. But, almost five years later, she still needed that hysterectomy – and now she had complications to consider.

Complications Make Surgery a Challenge

Her bout with COVID-19 compromised Tamara's lungs, and her primary care physician, Rebecca Pedersen, MD, was concerned about her going under anesthesia. Yet, her prolapsed uterus was worse than before and causing more problems. Heavy blood flow during menstrual cycles made it impossible for Tamara to leave home, even for her post-COVID physical therapy, and she had also developed a hernia near her belly button that needed attention.

Dr. Pedersen suggested that both surgeries be done consecutively to minimize anesthesia time, and encouraged a pre-op review by Ob/ Gyn physician Dr. Lee Sesslar, who agreed with the recommendations, and her pulmonologist, Dr. Mohamed Zeater*, who teams with FHN. He approved the surgery, but encouraged the briefest anesthesia time possible under the lowest amounts necessary for proper sedation.

Enter: Two Talented Surgeons

To help plan Tamara's surgery, Ob/Gyn physician and surgeon Keith Martin, MD, FACOG, and surgeon Javeria Qureshi, MD, MPH, FACS, worked with anesthesiologist Maria Laporta, MD*, to decide how to best optimize and expedite the procedures.

Each physician consulted with Tamara and went out of their way to keep her informed and educated. Dr. Martin handled Tamara's hysterectomy first, followed by Dr. Qureshi, who repaired the hernia. Both surgeries went as planned, and Tamara was in and out of the operating room quickly and without problems. "Both my surgeons had amazing bedside manners. They never hurried me and were so kind and concerned."

At her post-op check with Dr. Martin, he confirmed that everything had healed well and the surgery was a success.

"Dr. Martin was such a cheerleader," says Tamara. "He is so personable and immediately put me at ease. He assured me that everything had healed well, and I felt so blessed to be under his skilled care." All the problems she was experiencing from her prolapsed uterus and hernia are gone.

Even though Tamara is not quite back to 100 percent after her long journey, she is keenly aware of her progress and grateful for each day she feels stronger and better. "Last week I climbed three flights of stairs at Meet the Teacher night for my high school senior, and I struggled, but I did it," she declares.

"It is all about the little things - I can feed myself, I can roll over in bed, I can do the laundry, and now I am looking forward to all my children's big moments that I might have missed. I appreciate each minute with my kids and am grateful to God for not only my immediate family, but my FHN family. They all put me first. They helped me not only with their medical expertise and follow through, but also with their compassion, kindness, and encouragement. These people went above and beyond to make me better. I trust FHN more than any other facility and I 120 percent recommend them to anyone."

Since she came to FHN in 2020, Linn has worked to develop our Women's Health team's excellent continuum of care, from moving the specialists' primary offices to the Burchard Hills facility in Freeport to creating a connected Ob/Gyn hospitalist team and more.

OUR CARING TEAM

Though the Women's Healthcare Team at FHN might be most visible at our Burchard Hills location, we work throughout our organization – and communities – to promote women's health. From Burchard Hills to FHN Memorial Hospital, where you'll find our Family Birthing Center and the Women's Diagnostic Center, to care close to home at three of our regional clinics, we're dedicated to your health. Our Women's Health providers work with other providers, specialists, techs, and assistants throughout FHN to screen, evaluate and treat women of all ages for conditions ranging from breast and urogenital issues and painful periods to infertility, certain infections, incontinence, birth control, and menopause issues.

A COMPLETE CARE TEAM FOR MOMS AND BABIES

FHN's Women's Healthcare team includes our Ob/Gyn Hospitalists – five board-certified obstetriciangynecologists who have dedicated their career to the care of patients in the hospital. They work with FHN's primary Ob/Gyn providers to give new moms focused attention for labor, delivery, and those important early hours after childbirth. They will not be called away to the office and will always be within minutes of the FHN Birthing Center.

HELPED DEFINE THE ROLE

The benefits of this kind of expertise have been well-documented since the 1990s. In fact, FHN Ob/Gyn hospitalist

MORE PRIVACY, COMFORT FOR MOMS AND FAMILIES

One of FHN's most respected former Ob/Gyn specialists is an important part of a new project planned for the Family Birthing Center at FHN Memorial Hospital in Freeport: A generous donation from Dr. Farouk Isawi will fund more than half the cost of a soon to be remodeled OB Triage Room.

The renovation, which will re-orient the room and include new flooring, cabinets, sink, and counter as well as new furniture, will improve the functionality of the room and increase privacy for patients and their significant other or family member accompanying them.

"Updating this room for a more efficient and comfortable experience will complement the excellent care our Obstetrical team provides to all of our patients and their families, says Linn.

WOMEN'S HEALTH TESTING CENTER

The team's newest achievement, the Women's Health Testing Center, makes complete care more convenient for all types of women. It shares a reception desk with the Women's Healthcare offices on the second floor of the FHN Family Healthcare Center – Burchard Hills in Freeport and offers a wide array of services.

A large ultrasound room, two antenatal testing rooms and a procedure room offer a quiet, private seating area for patients. A team of talented, caring imaging technologists is available to assist providers with diagnostic and therapeutic procedures ranging from colposcopy, biopsies, endometrial, vulvar and other biopsies to LEEP (Loop Electrosurgical Excision Procedure) and cryotherapy.

The new center also offers non-stress testing for pregnant women and an upgraded ultrasound room with enough space to bring a few close family members for the appointment.

Here for Moms, Parents, and Babies -

every step of the way

Our Women's Healthcare team is proud to support moms with everything from planning a healthy pregnancy to having a safe, healthy birth. A very important part of that support is making sure mothers-to-be can get what they need for their families.

Parents-to-be take three classes to get ready for their baby's birth, taught by a combination of FHN nursing staff and SCHD experts.

The collaboration, the only one of its kind in the state, allows FHN and SCHD to offer the latest in updated audiovisual education as well as written materials, grantfunded gifts for each attendee and their support person for each of the classes they attend, and refreshments. The class is offered in Spanish three times a year.

This collaboration is an extension of an already-successful partnership, the FHN SCHD Breastfeeding Task Force.

"We have partnered with the SCHD since 2021 to educate mothers about the benefits of breastfeeding," Linn says. "We have had some encouraging success – this year, more than half of our moms are solely breastfeeding their babies when they're discharged from the hospital."

Linn and Stephenson County Health Department (SCHD) Director of Family Services Dana Keim wanted to build on that success and make sure new parents had all they needed for a healthy family.

Meeting a Growing Family's Needs

Late this summer, FHN made an addition to our prenatal schedule that will really make a difference for moms and their babies. "All of our pregnant patients are given the opportunity to meet with an SCHD representative here in our offices either before or after their prenatal visit appointment," Linn says. "That gives them a chance to hear about all of the programs, education, and support that's available, get their questions answered, and sign up for anything that may benefit them and their baby."

This "one-stop" streamlined experience allows the FHN and SCHD teams to make sure moms-to-be have all they need.

"Does she have food insecurity? The ability to get where she needs to go for provider appointments? Does she have problems paying rent? We're able to, at this early visit, connect momsto-be with the resources they'll need, because these things obviously are a big part of prenatal care," Linn says.

Once the baby is born, our team makes sure mom has another opportunity to ask for any support she needs. If she is from another county, the SCHD team will link her to her local health department for support.

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Mom's Birth Plan

Welcoming a baby into the world is an amazing, life-changing event, and our Women's Healthcare team works hard to give moms and their support persons everything they need for a safe, happy birthing experience.

Through months of check-ups and classes, pregnant moms get quite familiar with their team, from their provider's office to the Family Birthing Center.

"The goal of everyone on each mom's team is to give her as many opportunities to be in charge of what is happening during labor and delivery and, if a Caesarean-section or other intervention is needed, for mom to be in on that decision," Linn says.

Avoiding a C-section is a priority for us, too: FHN is part of a statewide initiative to promote vaginal births.

"We're part of the Illinois Perinatal Quality Collaborative (ILPQC), which is a statewide network of perinatal clinicians, nurses, hospitals, patients, public health leaders and policymakers working to improve healthcare for moms and babies," Linn says.

"Avoiding that first C-section, the goal of this initiative, is really good for moms and babies," Linn says. "Our Birthing Center team works with moms from the very start to give them every chance for a vaginal birth."

Moms-to-be learn about Spinning Babies[™], an approach to make pregnancy and birth easier, as part of their prenatal classes. When they are in labor, their team at the FHN Family Birthing Center are trained in Spinning Babies techniques, too.

"Nearly all of our nurses have completed Spinning Babies training," Linn says. "They learn different positions they can do to help the baby into the correct position for a vaginal birth."

It's **OCTOBER** ... and Time to **THINK PINK!**

With the coming of yellow leaves and orange pumpkins, October also brings us a reminder to "think pink" – it is **breast cancer awareness month**.

THIS MONTH, TAKE A PROACTIVE STEP TO STAY HEALTHY.

- Do a self-check (see box on the next page) for signs and symptoms of breast cancer.
- Schedule a mammogram ... it's easy! Call the FHN women's health scheduling team at 815-599-6860 to set up a convenient time for your screening. A provider's order is not necessary if you are already an established patient at FHN.
- Keep in mind additional women's health concerns, too. Have you had other important tests? Call and talk to your gynecologist or primary care provider and make sure you are up-to-date on important procedures.



◀ To help commemorate Breast Cancer Awareness Month, each person who receives a mammogram in October gets a goodie bag – in addition to knowing they are being proactive with their health!

WE KNOW EARLY DETECTION SAVES LIVES.

Routine cancer screening finds cancer early (even if you have no signs or symptoms!) and increases the likelihood your treatment will be successful if needed. Follow these handy guidelines to determine your needs.

MAMMOGRAM TESTING GUIDELINES

- Women should get annual mammograms starting at age 40.
- Mammograms should continue every year for all women as long as they are in good health and expected to live at least 10 more years.
- Women who believe they are at increased risk of breast cancer should talk to their healthcare provider to discuss recommendations.

DID YOU KNOW?

Breast cancer accounts for 12.5 percent of all new annual cancer cases worldwide, making it the most common cancer in the world.

About 85 percent of breast cancers occur in women who have no family history of breast cancer. These occur due to genetic mutations that happen as a result of the aging process and life in general, rather than inherited mutations.



▲ Our friendly and professional mammogram technologists are specially trained to give you a thorough and efficient screening with minimal discomfort.

A woman's risk of breast cancer nearly doubles if she has a first-degree relative (mother, sister, daughter) who has been diagnosed with breast cancer. Approximately 15 percent of women who get breast cancer have a family member diagnosed with it.

About 5 to 10 percent of breast cancers can be linked to known gene mutations inherited from one's mother or father. Mutations in the BRCA1 and BRCA2 genes are the most common.

Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States for Black and Hispanic women.

The overall breast cancer death rate has decreased steadily since 1989, for a total decline of 43 percent through 2020. As a result, 460,000 breast cancer deaths were averted in American women from 1989 through 2020. The decline in breast cancer mortality has been attributed to better and more targeted treatment and earlier detection.

How to Do a Breast Self-Exam

1 Standing in front of a mirror, look at your breasts.

- Check for:
- Changes in shape, size and color
- An even shape without noticeable swelling or distortion
- Dimpling, bulging or puckering of the skin
- An inverted (pushed in) nipple
- Swelling, redness, a rash or tenderness



2 Raise your arms straight up into the air and check for the changes listed in step 1.

3 Lower your arms and gently squeeze your nipples to check for leakage. Fluid could be watery, milky, yellow or bloody and come from one or both nipples.



Lie down and use your right hand to feel your left breast, then your left hand to feel your right breast.

- Using the first few finger pads and a smooth yet firm touch, make quarter-sized circular motions.
- Follow a pattern to make sure you cover the entire breast, vertically (from your collarbone to your abdomen) and horizontally (from your armpit to your cleavage).



• Some women use the "lawn-mowing" pattern of moving their fingers up and down in vertical rows across the breast. You can also start at the nipple and move outward with larger and larger circles.

6 Repeat step 4 while standing or sitting. Many women do this step in the shower because they find it's easier when their skin is wet.

Don't panic if you find a lump! Most women have lumpy breasts, and most breast lumps are benign (non-cancerous). The best time to examine your breasts is right after your period, when they tend to be the least lumpy.

Call your healthcare provider if you notice a change that is new or worrisome, especially if it has been there through a full menstrual cycle.

Welcoming HENRY

 Kellermanns Select FHN for Second Pregnancy When Samantha Kellermann of Lanark discovered she was pregnant with her second child, she knew she could count on FHN for her prenatal care, labor, and delivery. She and her husband, Josh, welcomed their daughter, Harper, at FHN's Birthing Center more than two years ago, and despite some challenges along the way, were happy with the care they received during and after pregnancy.

Sam's first trimester went off without a hitch, despite some bouts with nausea early on. She saw three OB providers during her prenatal visits: Dr. Lee Sesslar, MD, FACOG, and nurse practitioners Danielle Siedschlag, WHNP-BC, and Sara Smith, WHNP-BC. All of them provided excellent care, according to Sam.

EARLY PREGNANCY WAS SMOOTH SAILING DESPITE POTENTIAL RED FLAG

"I was lucky to have pretty smooth sailing and my care was always professional and compassionate," she explains. "Because my daughter was born with shoulder dystocia (her clavicle broke as she was moving down the birth canal), they recommended we have growth ultrasounds at 32 and 36 weeks to see if the new baby might be at additional risk. Those tests measured the baby's development and helped us be prepared should we need to go the C-section route."

Henry surprised everyone by debuting early, but without any issues, and was already scheduled to arrive via Caesarean section. Samantha says, "I would recommend FHN to anyone looking for OB care. The doctors and nurses were great!" Here, the Kellermanns pose in Harper's room, where the siblings will spend many future hours playing the day away. Although the tests showed growth rates within the norm and Sam was originally planning a vaginal birth, she and her husband ultimately decided a C-section was the best option for them and their baby.

"Danielle gave us a comprehensive overview of the Cesarean section process and how it would work. We knew just what to expect," shares Sam. They scheduled a time for the baby's arrival, but her new son determined that date was too late – Sam went into labor just shy of 38 weeks.

HENRY ARRIVES EARLY

"We were a little surprised, but knew the baby was far enough along that it wasn't too stressful," explains Samantha. "Dr. (Keith) Martin was our laborist for the delivery. He had provided prenatal and postnatal care for Harper, so we were comfortable with him and knew he would be great. The end of my pregnancy experience proved to be just as it had started with nausea - so some meds were provided to help me feel better. After spinal anesthetic, the actual Cesarean surgery went really fast and we were thrilled to welcome our son, Henry, on August 2nd!"

Sitting up can be a safe alternative for a patient to get out of bed as part of their healing and recovery process. The recliners even allow patients to watch television in a similar fashion to home!

The **bedside table/dresser** combination and **over-bed tables** provide a place for patients to comfortably and conveniently eat their meals and provide storage for, and easy access to, personal items, like phones, glasses, and hygiene products.

Saving Lives Without Major Surgery FHN Puts an Interventional Cardiologist on Your Care Team

You may have seen in our last Insight or on social media that Dr. Kilaru has come back to the FHN Cardiology team. We're very happy to have him back, and not just because he's a good guy and a great doctor!

Prasad Kilaru, MD, FSCAI, FACC is a specialist in interventional cardiology, and having him back at FHN means that our patients have increased access to a talented professional trained and skilled in state-of-the-art testing and procedures.

Physicians who specialize in interventional cardiology treat diseases within the heart and blood vessels. Dr. Kilaru is able to diagnose and treat disease through minimally invasive techniques, which makes recovery easier and faster for most patients.

The most common procedure done by interventional cardiologists is angioplasty and stent placement in the affected artery. In this life-saving procedure, Dr. Kilaru uses a catheter to find where plaque buildup has caused a blockage in a patient's arteries, then uses a tiny balloon to push the buildup aside and create a path for blood flow. In some cases, he uses a stent to keep the pathway open.

Interventional cardiologists also perform procedures to treat vascular conditions throughout the body, including intravascular lithotripsy, a procedure that uses sonic pressure to break up calcified plaques within vessels.

Dr. Kilaru's expertise puts him on the caring team for adults dealing with heart conditions and peripheral vascular disease.

The Story Behind All Those Letters

As you might expect, becoming an interventional cardiologist isn't a quick or easy process. After graduating from medical school, Dr. Kilaru completed an internal medicine residency at Cook County Hospital in Chicago.

After that, he completed a fellowship in cardiology and endocrinology at Cook County Hospital and a fellowship in interventional cardiology at Tufts University – Baystate Medical Center in Springfield, Mass.

The FSCAI credential after Dr. Kilaru's name signifies that he is a Fellow

in the Society for Cardiovascular Angiography. A physician must perform more than 1,000 procedures to qualify for Fellowship.

Dr. Kilaru's FACC credential means that he is a Fellow of the American College of Cardiology, which focuses on continued training, specialty board certification, and scientific and professional accomplishments. He's a widely published author and presenter for the American Heart Association and other medical publications, and has served as an assistant professor of medicine at Chicago's Rush Medical College.

With our state-of-the-art imaging system at The FHN Judy and Virgil Bocker Cardiovascular Center at FHN Memorial Hospital, Dr. Kilaru and FHN's Cardiovascular Team can see the vessels and anatomy of the heart, as well as the finest vessels all the way to the fingertips.
